TSA convention time means more to the women – in Austin, that is, – than a new frock, fellowship and a leisurely four days of fun. It's time ingenuity is put to the test for the pre-convention work to be done.

It's time for experienced knowhow, a lot of patience and prudent planning.

Full credit, then, for the pleasure derived at the 20th Annual Convention of TSA should go to the Woman's Architectural League, Central Texas Chapter of the Texas Society of Architects. These women have done the work, regardless of how many bows their husbands might take.

One accomodation and two events have been arranged by the WAL of Austin especially for women visitors.

First is the Hospitality Lounge set up in the Jim Hogg Suite of the Driskill Hotel and staffed by WAL members. Here you can find anything you might need from bobby pins and bridge cards to a list of approved baby sitters (with prevailing rates). It is the right spot for a renewal of old acquaintances and pleasant surroundings in which to meet a host of new ones. A Lounge Bulletin Board is provided for messages, should you want to leave one for an out-of-pocket husband.

At 1:00 p.m. Thursday, October 15, a luncheon will be served at the Deck Club of the Commodore Perry Hotel, honoring the wives of TSA founders and presidents. John Henry Faulk, nationally known satirist and television star, will be featured, along with a casual showing of fall fashions. A \$3 per person ticket includes this function plus the Chat'n' Sherry Party beginning at noon at the same location.

Thirdly, dont miss the "Hasta Luego Tea at 3 p. m. Friday, in the new Capital Club, quartered in the Stephen F. Austin Hotel. This farewell tea with Mexican music and a "Gran Sorpresa" will honor El Paso ladies as hostesses of the 1960 convention. Charge, \$1.25 per ticket.

These three features, exclusively for the women visitors, are in addition to the other activities to which the women are cordially invited. These, of course, include the Golf Breakfast and Pre-Convention Cocktail Party on Wednesday; the Breakfast, Coffee at the Governor's Mansion and Gay Nineties Party on Thursday; the Awards luncheon, Cocktail Party and TSA Water Show plus the President's Dinner and Ball at Westwood Country Club on Friday; and the State House Reception, Tour of the Capitol Area and Austin Symphony Ball in the Municipal Auditorium on Saturday. All Women's Activities of the convention are detailed in the "pony tail" program.

How did all these arrangements and accomodations come about? Certainly, they didn't "just happen." Actually, the planning began some six years ago. It was on September 15, 1953—just three months before the last TSA convention in Austin—that the Woman's Architectural League of the Central Texas Chapter, TSA, was founded.

Mrs. R. Max Brooks, current chapter president, served as chairman of the organization meeting of Austin architects' wives in the Maximilian Room of the Driskill Hotel.

Mrs. Conrad Kroll presented the first slate of officers. They were: Mrs. Charles Granger, president; Mrs. R. Gommel Roessner, vice-president; Mrs. Leonard Lundgren, recording secretary; Mrs. Winfred Gustafson, corresponding secretary; and Mrs. Claude Pendley, treasurer.

The continuing purpose of the WAL of Austin is to advance the architectural profession, to create greater public interest in the profession, and to promote friendship and unity within the group.

From the tenure of Mrs. Granger in 1953-54 to the current administration of Mrs. Brooks (1959-60), there have been four other presidents of WAL of Austin: Mrs. Hugo Kuehne, Sr., 1954-55; Mrs. Winfred O. Gustafson, 1955-56; Mrs. Barton D. Riley, 1956-57; Mrs. Doyle Baldridge, 1957-58 and Mrs. Arthur Fehr, 1958-59.

The League set a fast pace in excellent public relations for the profession when its membership went to work as the "Howdy Girls" and functioned as official hostesses to some 500 visitors to the TSA convention in 1953. Off to a splendid start, the League knew its "purpose" could best be accomplished through continuing activities on its own, and in joint affairs with the TSA chapter. Christmas parties, style shows, coffees and sponsorship of public tours of contemporary homes in Austin are item entries in the WAL's well-kept "Scrapbook" year after year. In 1956, the tour of contemporary homes in Austin was conducted during Texas Architects Week. The proceeds from the tour, \$400, were turned over to an education fund of the Texas Architectural Foundation to be used on a project of the WAL-placement of educational material concerning the profession of architecture in the Austin senior and junior high schools.

Then again, in 1957, the League came up with its share and sent

donations to help furnish the Octagon, home of the AIA, in Washington, D. C.

All these fine accomplishments, plus the day-to-day activities of WAL and the fun and gay times you will have at this 20th Annual TSA convention seem to confirm the sentiments of Kate Fields in her famed "Woman's Way"—

They talk about a woman's sphere

As though it had a limit,

There's not a place in earth and Heaven,

There's not a task to mankind given,

There's not a whisper "Yes" or "no."

There's not a life, a death, a birth,

There's not a feather's weight of worth

Without a woman in it.

# TSA Looks at Itself

Some Stocktaking . . . .

Is Convention Theme

TEXAS architects are planning to celebrate the twentieth anniversary of their professional organization, the Texas Society of Architects, this month by examining carefully every one of those candles on the cake—and trying to figure out how those in the future can be improved.

TSA's annual convention, Oct. 14-17, will be held at the organization's birthplace, Austin. And it's going to be more fun than a "do-it-yourself psychiatry kit.

The subject for the seminar on Friday morning, Oct. 16, is, in itself, a capsule summary of the Convention's theme: "The Texas Society of Architects Looks at Itself."

In addition to looking at itself, TSA is planning to make a detailed analysis of itself—and the profession. By looking at the past and studying the present, Texas architects feel they can identify their present weaknesses—as individuals, as well as an organization—and correct them in order to render more effective service in the future.

The Friday morning seminar will feature a wide variety of the profession's members. Taking part will

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be young architects and "elder" architects, architects from small firms and architects from large firms, architects from small towns and architects from large towns, and architects from every geographical nook and cranny of the State.

They will dissect and examine thoroughly the "Handbook of Practice" to determine how its theories are being utilized in their own areas, to report on how architects in their individual areas are living up to the standards outlined in the Handbook, and to express their opinions on changes they believe should be made in the Handbook.

As in other vital areas to be explored during the convention, officials of the American Institute of Architects will be on hand to help promote the self-improvement goal that has been established.

Thursday afternoon, another important seminar will be held. It's title: "Together We Stand." It will explore thoroughly the relationship of architects with other professions and will feature representatives of medicine, law, education, contracting, engineering and banking. It will provide an up-to-date analysis of current problems in such varied fields as economic trends and the latest interpretations of legal problems.

What will, perhaps, be one of the most important sessions of the annual meeting is scheduled for Wednesday afternoon, Oct. 14. That is when officers of all the local chapters will gather for a three-hour seminar that will tackle all of the many, varied problems on the operation of local chapters. Discussions will center around such practical subjects as

capturing the interest of chapter members, planning program and handling various special projects.

Meeting of allied groups will also be important in the overall convention scheme.

For instance, there will be a special seminar on Friday afternoon for officers of the student chapters and their faculty advisors. The trustees and the board of directors for the Texas Architectural Foundation will meet in connection with the Convention. On the day before the Convention opens, the Texas Board of Architectural Examiners will meet and go into such diverse subjects as current architectural education in schools, the architect - in - training program, and various research programs.

Obviously, there is only one way you can fail to benefit from the Twentieth Annual Convention of the Texas Society of Architects and that is to stay home.



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

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


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# MORE FUN!

## Be Prepared to Have the Time of Your Life at TSA's 20th Annual Convention

Some of the most unique entertainment this side of Hollywood awaits delegates to the Texas Society of Architects' 20th Annual Convention in Austin, Oct. 14-17.

While even the business sessions are certain to be pleasant, you can be assured that they won't be allowed to interfere with the pure, undiluted pleasure being planned by the Central Texas Chapter's flock of well-organized committees.

Arthur Fehr, president of the Central Texas Chapter, has been cracking the whip over these committees with such skill and enthusiasm that some of the productions being planned may turn out to be even more elaborate than the Broadway hit, "My Fair Lady."

For instance, it seems wise to issue at least one warning in advance: don't become alarmed Friday evening at the picturesque Westwood Country Club, located on the shores of beautiful Lake Austin, if you suddenly seem to be suffering from an hallucination that Washington is crossing the Delaware right before your eyes.

It won't be Washington, of course, and it isn't the Delaware, but Fehr is planning a surprise act—in connection with the unique water show to be staged that night—which is such a mystery he hasn't solved it completely himself as yet. While his sleuthing continues toward its inevitable successful conclusion, the word has leaked out about some of the other acts in the water show—and they will include terrific displays of swimming and diving.

Athletic activity once again will open the Convention—well, almost, anyway. The first event, at 8:45 a.m. Wednesday, will be a "Golf Breakfast" at the Austin Country Club and it will be followed im-

mediately by the annual T.S.A. Golf Tournament.

The day will be climaxed by the pre-convention cocktail party at the Driskill Hotel.

After an unprecedented coffee at the Governor's Mansion, where the delegates will be guests of Gov. and Mrs. Price Daniel on Thursday morning, the social whirl will be interrupted briefly for business sessions described elsewhere in this issue.

Thursday evening, the architects and their wives are in for a real treat when they visit the Austin Civic Theatre for an old-fashioned melodrama party, where they will be encouraged to hiss the villian as he threatens Our Little Nell and cheer the hero as he saves her. "Gay '90's" costumes are optional for this affair.

A full day of business sessions Friday will be climaxed by the Producer's Council Cocktail Party and the T.S.A. Water Show at Westwood, to be followed by the President's Ball there and special recognition for T.S.A. founders and charter members.

There will be a drawing that evening—for a trip to San Francisco next April for the A.I.A. convention.

Saturday morning, a State House Reception in the Senate Chamber is scheduled, to be followed by refreshments in the adjoining suite of Lt, Gov. Ben Ramsey.

Tours of local offices and new buildings will then be available, to be followed by a series of private home parties for football television during the afternoon.

And, for those still on their feet, the Annual Austin Symphony Orchestra Ball is on tap Saturday night. It will be held in Austin's new, fascinating Municipal Auditorium and special tables will be


